HILTON HEAD ISLAND MIDDLE SCHOOL VISION AND MISSION STATEMENT

VISION STATEMENT

We envision the Hilton Head Island Middle School community working together to build a culture that supports diversity in a safe, nurturing, and engaging environment.

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of Hilton Head Island Middle School is to provide challenging curricula with high expectations for learning that develop productive citizens who can solve problems and contribute to a global society.

CORE

The vision and mission of Hilton Head Island Middle School makes it imperative to implement the following objectives:

1. To provide a safe environment.
2. To provide academic excellence by incorporating researched-based effective practices and rigorous programs.
3. Through high expectations, develop in each student the ability to think, be responsible, respectful, and honest in order to positively impact academic achievement.
4. To encourage stewardship of the environment.
5. To stimulate each student's creativity and problem-solving ability.
6. To encourage students to respect the attitudes, values, and culture of others as well as their own.
7. To provide students with experiences that promotes meaningful relationships, and the development of social problem-solving skills.
8. To develop a positive self-image and self-efficacy in students by providing them with individual acceptance, encouragement, and recognition when appropriate.

SCHOOL RENEWAL PLAN GOALS

GOAL 1: Student Achievement – By 2023-2024, we will close the achievement gap by reducing the number of African-American, LEP, disable students scoring in the ‘not met’ from 53% to 40% in ELA and from 57% to 45% in math; LEP will reduce from 43% to 35% in math and ELA; students with disabilities will reduce from 81% to 76% in ELA and from 77% to 72% in math.

GOAL 2: Teacher/Administrator Quality – By 2023-2024, at least two days per week, teachers will implement engaging tier one instructional strategies as learned in professional development sessions for co-teaching/inclusion, technology integrations, the Literacy Design Collaborative/Mathematics Design Collaborative, and the Middle Years Programme (IB).

GOAL 3: School Climate – By 2023-2024, we will collaborate with stakeholders to develop a positive school environment, as measured by a minimum of 70% satisfactory rating for each area of the student, teacher, and parent surveys.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL GOALS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

GOAL 1: Building our Facebook and E-mail network

Achievements: Increased FB presence by 250 Followers, E-mail network by 250 members, Registered volunteers increased by 169 from prior year, The Stingray Support Circle met 97% of needs presented to them

GOAL 2: Increase community and local business support of HHIMS

Achievements: Increased awareness of school needs, Increased involvement of local mentoring groups, connected community members with school to provide supplies and service days at HHIMS

GOAL 3: Communicating with HHIMS families/community way to get involved

Achievements: Sent out StingRAYSing Awareness Newsletter and increased our presence through local media and publications, contacted by other schools to evaluate and duplicate The Stingray Support Circle

Goal 4: Supporting Teachers and Staff

Achievements: Increased internal awareness of The Stingray Support Circle, provided teacher’s wish list requests, secured many volunteers for teacher led events

GOAL 5: Increasing Stingray Support Circle items provided to students and families

Achievements: Over 500 student visits to The Support Circle for clothes, toiletries or food items, doubled the amount of gently used school uniforms donated, Holiday bags distributed to students in need doubled, had an 8th promotion clothing drive, hosted a holiday “free of charge” shopping day for parents, purchased 75 additional Stingray Hoodies for students in need, distributed over 1080 snack bags to students, were successful in fundraising and grant donations to The Stingray Support Circle

POSITIVE BEHAVIORAL INTERVENTIONS & SUPPORTS (PBIS)

PBIS is an approach for assisting school personnel in adopting and organizing evidence-based behavioral interventions. The approach enhances academic and social behavior for all students. PBIS is not a packaged curriculum or scripted intervention. PBIS is a prevention-oriented way for school personnel to (a) organize evidence-based practices, (b) improve their implementation of those practices, and (c) maximize academic and social behavior outcomes for all students. At HHIMS, effective classroom management and preventive school-wide discipline are essential for supporting teaching and learning. PBIS emphasizes that effective classroom management and school-wide discipline must be integrated and working together with effective academic instruction in a positive and safe school climate to maximize success for all students.

INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE MIDDLE YEARS PROGRAM

Hilton Head Island Middle School is an IB World School and implements the Middle Years Program instructional framework.

The MYP includes 8 subjects: Language & Literature, Language Acquisition (foreign language), Math, Science, Individuals & Societies (Social Studies), Design (computer tech), Art & Music, and Health & PE.

In each of these subjects, inquiry-based instructional units are developed. The IB framework emphasizes conceptual learning and seeks to help students make connections between local issues and global concerns. In addition, interdisciplinary connections are made to make learning relevant and meaningful to students.

Authentic assessment takes place, in addition to traditional assessment, and students are expected to demonstrate learning and understanding in ways that go beyond multiple-choice tests. Projects, presentations, and collaborative activities are part of each instructional unit.

Community Service is expected of IB students and each grade level develops service projects that align with lines of inquiry and state standards. All students are expected to participate in these activities.

Character education is also a major component and the IB focuses on 8 traits – called the Learner Profile, with the aim of developing learners who are knowledgeable, thinkers, communicators, principled, open-minded, caring, risk-takers, balanced, and reflective. IB learners are expected to be scholars who take action to make the world a better place!

STUDENT PERFORMANCE DATA

HHMS students scored above THE district average in 6th grade on the SC Ready Reading assessment in the % Meets/Exceeds category. Students also scored above the district averages in 6th and 7th grades on the SC Ready Math assessment in the % Meets/Exceeds category. On the SC PASS Science assessment 8th graders exceeded the district average by 2 percentage points and 6th graders exceeded the district average by .8 percentage points on the SC PASS Social Studies assessment.

2018-2019 STINGRAY HIGHLIGHTS

- HHIMS students meeting criteria submitted applications for the Hilton Head Island School Chapter of the National Junior Honor Society. 33 7th and 8th grade candidates were inducted into the HHIMS Chapter of the National Junior Honor Society.
- 1 to 1 Dell Device implementation for all students and teachers. Teachers and students continue to use devices as a tool to enhance learning in the classroom.
- Student chosen as “Mayor” of Hilton Head Island at Student Government Day,
- Tiny Techz Club built a small-scale trebuchet. Best design winner was built as a large-scale working model. Students programmed strawberry pies to create video games.
- Tiny Techz Club field trip to Gulfstream to learn the engineering of the dike system used at the Savannah National Wildlife Refuge.
- The Orchestra combined with Hilton Head Island High School received an Excellent rating and 1st place in a National Music competition in Orlando, Florida
- Gulfstream, Water Treatment Plant and Nature Exploration in Sea Pines field trips
- 10 students represented HHIMS in BCSD All County Orchestra
- The HHIMS band hosted 3 piano players from the HHI International Piano competition. Students had an interactive session with the professional musicians from Russia, China and South Korea.
- HHIMS teacher recognized as Future Scholar Financial Literacy Program Educator of the Month by the South Carolina State Treasurer.
- 3 Duke Tip Finalists who received State Recognition
- Choir performed as part of the Ray Factor Talent Show.
- Approximately 80 students participated in the HHIMS Science Fair. Of those students, 24 went on to compete in the Sea Island Regional Science with three students placing in the biology category.
- The HHIMS NJHS & Student Council sponsored service projects raising funds for HHIMS family fire victims and those in need.
- 6 students achieved a maximum raw score on the SC Ready Math test
- The HHIMS Band program received donations from the Jazz Foundation, HHIMS PTA and HHIMS parents. Instruments were donated by the Jazz Corner.
- 2 HHIMS teachers were recipients of \$2,000 and \$4,000 grants from the Community Foundation of the LowCountry
- Girls Basketball placed 2nd overall in county
- 244 HHIMS student athletes participated in sports this school year.
- HHIMS Wrestling Team are County Champions with 3 students competing at the state level
